The Extended Family's Place in Today's World

Here in Alaska school has started and with that comes the yearly problem in Native villages for schools to determine who each student lives with verses legal parents verses caretakers, etc. Schools can be very dramatic in their exclamation on the difficulties they go through determining the correct contact, keeping confidentiality while still informing the correct adults in charge of a school youth member.

America holds onto an aged out belief that somehow 'nuclear' family units (mom, dad, 2.5 children) are the normal and therefore what school protocol goes by. Yet the facts show, nuclear family units are the smallest family type. They have been exchanged with 'extended family' units because of economics, relationships and/or just to increase support around youth.

In the villages I worked in schools have created a family tree of sorts that allows children to put down who their birth parents are; who they live with currently; who can legally speak for them; who does their day care, and space for 5-10 emergency contacts. Although a bit crazy for schools to set up and manage, the bonus for the child outweighs the negatives. Again, in the long run, this system is much easier to manage as there is always an adult ready to come to the school in support of a child.

In our family having extra people living in our home was/is normal. That is what couches were made for I thought growing up. I am glad this tradition continues for most of our tribe's units. We do not think it is strange or weak for adult children to live with parents (or vice-versa); youth who need to transition to adulthood or need a temporary home outside their birth home are not looked upon as weak and we certainly do not look to outside the blood family to create a separate family-we have plenty of family to rely on. Friend family groups are wonderful, but I am glad I have blood family too.

Being in a tribal, extended family is not without its struggles. Lots of opinion, disagreements, potential hurt feelings happen. However, if everyone keeps to the family vision/goal you won't stray too far from the right path. Our Salinan Tribe is a larger extension of our smaller family units. The Salinan Vision keeps us focused in the right direction.

Do not think you are strange for keeping family close to you; for sharing your home, time and resources with extended family members. The value of having more than one generation, more than 2 parents, more than one paycheck, more than one set of talents is part of being diverse.

America will be much stronger when they remember tribal traditions have held true through time and produces some of our strongest leaders. Diversity works. With patience maybe America will return from their nuclear family mind set, to a more cohesive tribal family mind set. It is good for the children.


