As a council member you will be expected to attend monthly business meetings and general meetings along with helping with the yearly Tribal gathering and fundraiser. Beloved Husband, Dad, Brother, Grandpa, Great Grandpa, Great Great Grandpa. Bennie F. McCormack, A.K.A. Benito, Benjamin, Ben. He went to join his wife Wanda of 57 years with Our Lord and Savior on Monday May 31, 2021. He was born on May 5, 1933 in Lockwood California to Benito A. McCormack and Suzy Boronda McCormack. He resided in Guadalupe Ca for approximately 52 years. Bennie is survived by Brothers John McCormack of San Lucas, CA. George McCormack of Madera Ca. Sisters Patricia Andersson of Anchorage Alaska. Irene Duckworth of Greenfield Ca. Bennie is of Salinan and Costanoan Native American Indian. He went to school in San Lucas CA and High School in King

City CA where he played football and was a cross country runner. His wife Wanda was a majorette at King City High where they fell head over heels in Love. They married May 28, 1951.
